Young Mums in Cambridge to receive vital support thanks to Freemasons' Grant.

Around 50 young teenaged mums aged 14–20 in Cambridge and surrounding areas, many facing isolation, poverty, and poor mental health, will receive essential personalised support thanks to a grant from Cambridgeshire Freemasons to the Young Parents Programme (YPP) from the Romsey Mill charity.

The £58,000 grant will empower these young mums to build confidence, strengthen bonds with their children, and create stable futures. YPP is one aspect of the work of Romsey Mill, a Cambridge-based charity creating opportunities with young people, families and local communities.

The funding will support tailored one-to-one engagement, a cornerstone of YPP, providing practical help with parenting, mental health, housing, benefits, and re-engagement with education or employment. Young mums, often referred to the programme by midwives, social workers, or schools, frequently report feeling judged or excluded. The YPP offers a safe, non-judgmental space, with 92 per cent of participants recently reporting improved mental health and reduced isolation, and 70 per cent progressing into education, training, or work.

The grant from Cambridgeshire Freemasons comes through the Masonic Charitable Foundation, which is funded by Freemasons, their families and friends, from across England and Wales.




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During their visit to Romsey Mill, W.Bro. Mark Shields ProvGM (designate), and W.Bro. Tony Barrios were shown around the facilities.

A food preparation class led by Heather Duke was underway, and W.Bro. Mark Shields, ProvGM (designate) joined in, peeling some vegetables and chatting with the young mums taking part. Heather Duke, Young Parents Team Coordinator at Romsey Mill, said: *"We're very grateful to Cambridgeshire Freemasons for this generous grant. It will help transform lives as Romsey Mill equips young mums with the tools to thrive as parents and individuals, breaking cycles of disadvantage. This grant is vital for sustaining the long-term, relational work we do with young mums. Building trusted relationships over time helps them feel valued and supported, creating lasting change for them and their children."*

W.Bro. Mark Shields, ProvGM (designate) said: *"I'm very pleased we've been able to help Romsey Mill with their hugely important project helping young mothers from Cambridge. Whether it's dealing with mental health issues or providing assistance with getting back into education or employment, it will reduce the isolation that so many young mothers feel and make a real contribution to giving them a brighter future."*

During the visit, Freemasons toured the facilities and met service users, adults with learning disabilities who benefit from Branching Out's enriching work experiences and social activities. The warm welcome and vibrant atmosphere underscored the charity's vital role in the community.



The Lodge's Ladies Festival, held on Saturday 20th September at The Maltings (the very venue where the Lodge was consecrated in 1975), was a highlight of the celebrations. Organised by W.Bro. John Sinclair and his wife Kay, the event raised over £2,300 for Branching Out. Worshipful Master W.Bro. Peter Matthews and his Lady Lis described the evening as unforgettable, with two representatives from the charity joining in the festivities.

On 24th September, the Lodge's official birthday, a special meeting was held to reflect on its history. Masters from Nourse Lodge, St Audrey Lodge (the Mother Lodge), and Walpole Lodge (the Founding Master's Mother Lodge) participated in the commemorative ceremony. W.Bro. Peter Crussell, Provincial Junior Grand Warden, delivered an insightful presentation on Masonic aprons, followed by a Festive Board and raffle.

Combined with the Ladies Festival proceeds, the total raised reached £2,664.32, pushing Branching Out past its £30,000 goal.

To conclude this inspiring journey, W.Bro. John and Kay Sinclair, along with W.Bro. Peter and Lis Matthews, visited Branching Out on 3rd October to present the funds and reconnect with the service users.



Cambridgeshire Freemasons Joined the National Service of Remembrance to Honour the Armed Forces

The United Grand Lodge of England (UGLE), which oversees Freemasonry in England and Wales, had signed the Armed Forces Covenant in October 2021, a pledge to support those who served, or had served, in the Armed Forces, and their families.

Since then, UGLE's commitment had been recognised with the Ministry of Defence Employer Recognition Scheme (ERS) Gold Award, the highest honour given to organisations that went above and beyond to support the Armed Forces community.

To mark this commitment, Freemasons from across the country gathered at the National Memorial Arboretum in Staffordshire on Saturday 1 November for a National Service of Remembrance at The Masonic Memorial Garden.



In the lead-up to the service, members of the Widows Sons Masonic Bikers Association (WSMBA) travelled across the UK, collecting wreaths from every Masonic Province. These wreaths were brought together and laid at the Arboretum by senior Masonic representatives in a moving act of remembrance.

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Cambridgeshire Freemasons took part, represented by the AProvGM, W.Bro. Jonathan Lambert, a wreath bearer, and W.Bro. Clapperton a standard bearer, all of whom joined the official procession. The AProvGM W.Bro. Jonathan Lambert stated: *"Cambridgeshire Freemasons were immensely proud to stand alongside the Armed Forces community at this national act of remembrance. This occasion allowed us to honour those who made the ultimate sacrifice in service of their country, and to reaffirm our ongoing commitment to supporting veterans, serving personnel, and their families."*

For Cambridgeshire, the journey began on 23rd September 2025, when the Cambridgeshire Province Wreath was ceremonially collected from the AssProvGM, W.Bro. Jonathan Lambert and the memorial contingent beside the City of Ely War Memorial by the WSMBA. The wreath remained in their safekeeping for transportation to the National Arboretum where, on Saturday 1 November 2025, it was reunited with the memorial contingent in preparation for the ceremony.

A moving service followed with hymns, poems and blessings, all of which were enhanced by music from the Gresley Colliery Brass Band. The procession of over 90 officials and dignitaries, including one of the Assistant Grand Masters of UGLE, the National Chair of the Royal British Legion, W.Bro. Warrant Officer Johnson Beharry VC COG PPGStwd, and the Province of Cambridgeshire contingent, moved solemnly to the Masonic Memorial Garden for the wreath-laying and final prayers.



A hot fork buffet followed, along with the unique opportunity to meet and forge new friendships with like-minded people from across the UK.

This event provided a unique foundation for Freemasons to publicly honour the bravery and sacrifices of the Armed Forces and to show continued support for those who had served.

Cambridge & Isle of Ely District hosts Annual Service of Thanksgiving

The Cambridge & Isle of Ely District Rose Croix has been in its present form since 1998 now under the leadership of its 3rd Inspector General, V.°.Ill.°.Bro. Justin Curtis 33°. However, Ancient & Accepted Rite masonry existed in the area long before that when from 1874 Eastern Central District was formed by Supreme Council. East Anglia District succeeded it in 1926. With the growth in the Order flourishing, 1976 saw East Anglia further sub divided with the formation of the District of Norfolk & Isle of Ely and the District of Suffolk and Cambridge. However, the 1998 re-structuring brings us up to date by the formation of the District of Norfolk, the District of Suffolk and the District of Cambridge & Isle of Ely.

Because of those valuable historic ties, the 'family' of Rose Croix masonry in East Anglia is a very close one. Since 1998 each district has hosted in turn an Annual Service of Thanksgiving. This year it was the turn of Cambridge & Isle of Ely and on Sunday 5th October held an Evensong at St. Peter's Church in March. A total of just under 60 attended from all three Districts ending with afternoon tea held at the nearby March Masonic Hall.

The Service was conducted by Rev'd Andrew Smith, Team Rector and Rural Dean of March and very ably assisted by Rev'd Father Ex&P Bro. David Goode 18°, a member at The Octagon in Ely Chapter No.1076. The 60 strong congregation enjoyed an uplifting service. At the conclusion a collection was taken raising a total of £280 shared equally between St. Peter's Church and the District. The District donation of £140 has been delivered to the current Craft Provincial appeal for the Maggie's Cancer Charity.

For 2026, the Service of Thanksgiving will be hosted by the Suffolk District and will, as usual, be open to all masons whether of the Order or not. Watch out for further details and a date in due course.

V.°.III.°.Bro. Justin Curtis 33° Inspector General accompanied by III.°.Bro. Brian Elliott 31°, District Recorder, recently had the pleasure of visiting V.°.III.°.Bro. Deryck Gent 33° Past Inspector General at his home to present the Supreme Council 33° certificate for over 50 years of service to the Order.

Bro. Deryck was Perfected into Hereward Chapter No.660 in September 1974 becoming Most Wise Sovereign in 1988. Receiving his 30° in 1990 and 31° in 1995 he became the first IG for the District of Cambridge & Isle of Ely in 1998, which post he held until retiring in 2008. 1998 was a momentous year for Bro. Deryck in successfully steering the newly formed District following the separation from Suffolk and Norfolk Districts. During his term as IG, he also oversaw the formation of Icen Chapter No.1126 in 2000 and Cambridge & Isle of Ely Chapter No.1157 in 2003 both as a Founder member. He is also a Founder member of Octagon in Ely Chapter No.1076 in 1999.



CUFS Opens Doors and Sparks Curiosity Among Students Through Events

Growing numbers of Cambridge students are exploring Freemasonry's traditions and values, as the Cambridge University Freemasonry Society (CUFS) makes a strong start to the academic year with a series of successful events and initiatives designed to introduce students to the Craft and strengthen ties with the wider fraternity.

At the Cambridge Freshers' Fair, CUFS attracted considerable interest, with more than 70 students — both men and women — signing up to learn more about the Craft. Reflecting on the response, WBro Simon Cooper, CUFS Vice President, remarked: *"It was fantastic to engage with so many students, get Freemasonry's message out there, dispel a few myths, and see real genuine interest from male and female students."*



Following the fair, CUFS hosted an open house at the Cambridge Masonic Hall. Students were welcomed into the building and had the chance to meet and socialise informally with members of both the United Grand Lodge of England (UGLE) and the Order of Women Freemasons (OWF). This gave students the opportunity to engage, ask questions, and gain first-hand insight into the fraternity in a relaxed setting, whilst allowing members of both Grand Lodges to do likewise, something supported by UGLE with the formation of the Council of Freemasonry initiative.

During November, the society organised a visit to London where students joined INUL members for a tour of the Museum of Freemasonry and the Grand Temple at Great Queen Street. Reflecting on the visit, WBro Jacob Baldwin, CUFS Secretary and INUL Worshipful Master, remarked: *"Seeing the Grand Temple in person is always inspiring, and it gave our students a real sense of the history and values that underpin Freemasonry."* The tour engaged members and students alike, sparking greater interest in the fraternity and its traditions.

As a result of these initiatives, several CUFS members are due to join INUL at its December meeting, demonstrating the tangible success of the outreach efforts and the growing interest in Freemasonry among Cambridge students.



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Looking ahead, CUFS has planned a series of socials, a guest night, and speaker events. The speaker programme will feature representatives from UGLE and OWF, who will discuss the history of women's Freemasonry and the positive role of Freemasonry in personal development. These events will provide further opportunities for students to connect with existing members and explore the fraternity in an open and welcoming environment.



Importantly, the OWF has recently announced plans to consecrate a second women's lodge in Cambridge in the new year, creating new pathways into Freemasonry for women at the University. CUFS members have been actively supporting this initiative, reflecting the society's commitment to inclusivity and ensuring that Freemasonry is accessible to all who wish to explore it. Bro. Karen Ottewell, CUFS Senior Treasurer, remarked: *"The establishment of a women's university lodge here in Cambridge is a vital step in making Freemasonry truly inclusive for our students. It ensures that everyone, regardless of gender, has the opportunity to engage with the fraternity and benefit from its values."*

Through these efforts, the Cambridge University Freemasonry Society continues to play a vital role in demystifying Freemasonry, fostering curiosity, and strengthening the bonds between students and the wider Masonic community.
